Club Annual Game Dinner: January 23rd



During these seasonably cold days, the Black Powder boys and girls are busy melting down chunks of lead harvested from kitchen sinks, drain pipes, and the local scrap metal dump. This 100% pure lead is poured into ingots of usually one pound each in preparation for the next stage: bullet molding. Ever so carefully, each bullet is molded separately for musket and carbine. Often

the revolver, a round ball, is a two-cavity mold, so you can get a two-for-one pouring. Hundreds of each of these bullets will be molded, cooled, and then placed into a cartridge, in readiness for practice on a warm day this winter or at the latest next May when the skirmishes begin again.

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Boy Scouts Venturing Crew Possible at Fin

Venturing is a youth development program for young men and women who are 14 years old, and have completed 8th grade, through 20 years old. The program's purpose is to prepare the youths to be responsible and caring adults.

Venturing is based on a unique and dynamic relationship between youth, adult leaders, and organizations in their communities. Local organizations establish a venturing crew by matching their people and program resources to the interests of the young people in the community. The result is a program with exciting and meaningful activities that help the youth pursue special interests, to grow, to develop leadership ability, and to become good citizens.

A Venturing Crew is like a team, always working together for the common good they have established. Examples of the kinds of things a Venturing Crew might take on are as follows.

- Learning to make ethical choices over their lifetimes by instilling values in the Venturing Oath and Code.
- Experience a program that is fun and full of challenge and adventure.
- Become a skilled training and program resource for Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, and other youth groups.
- Acquire skills in the areas of high adventure, sports, arts, and hobbies, religious life, or Sea Scouting.
- Have a chance to learn and grow in a supportive, caring, and fun environment.

If when reading this notice you developed the impression that

this would entail a good bit of work on the part of a responsible adult, you are right on the mark. Anyone who has ever volunteered to help youngsters, be it with the many different sports teams, after school programs, and the like knows full well that the call for help with organizing a Venturing Crew entails work. But at the same time, commitments to help others, and especially youth, have rewards that go beyond description. The satisfaction of knowing that you have helped a youngster at a critical stage in his or her life to make the right choices in life is its own reward.

The Executive Committee is interested in supporting a Venturing Crew that has interests matching ours. If you would like to make a difference in the lives of young people in our community, step up to the plate. Get hold of Mike Sobol and he'll give you the necessary information. Do a good turn.


