



TREASURER'S REPORT



As of December 6th the tax return for our club has been completed. We ended up with a taxable income of \$14,000 and owe \$2,139 in federal and \$326 state taxes. The Fin is like a small business in terms of the income and expenses and I do my best to make sure that all members see the sources of revenues and expenses. I have included some charts below that you may find of interest. Club expenses, bar expenses and shotgun sports comprised 74 % of our total expenses. The top three categories in terms of income were bar income, membership activities, and shotgun sports and these accounted for 75% of all income. Please note that the second biggest category for income has no expenses, i.e., our club operates from our dues and assessments. The second thing I would like everyone to see is that the total income was \$319,801.69 and total expenses, \$296,424.63. There is a lot of money coming and going at our club. We are always in need of ideas for money making activities. We have nice facilities and they can be put to good work for both fun functions and income generation. Please become involved and try to earn some money for our club.









SIGN OUT YOUR FISH

A recent summary of our fish program revealed that a large number of fish are unaccounted for (i.e., the number recorded as being harvested is low relative to the number of fish stocked). Our fish ponds are a wonderful asset and we ask that everyone that uses this resource takes the time to "sign out" the fish that they keep. We are pleased when our members take advantage of the opportunity to harvest fish but we need a better accounting of the inputs and outputs for budget planning purposes. Thanks.

REGISTERED SKEET SHOOTS 2007, 2008, 2009 Frank Mauri

Three registered skeet shoots were held at the Fin this year. The Northeast Open, our premier event was held the weekend of June 1st. This shoot was a 500-target affair with 100 targets shot in each of the 5 competitions. These are Doubles, 12 Ga., 20 Ga., 28 Ga. and .410. There were 102 entries in the shoot. Each entry paid \$38.00 for a total gross income of \$3876.00. After all expenses were met including the cost of targets thrown we showed a net profit of \$818.00. The Fin Open was held on Sunday July 15th. This was a smaller shoot involving the 12 Ga. and 20 Ga. only. A total of 50 entries were in this shoot with 26 in the 12 Ga. and 24 in the 20 Ga. Each entry paid \$38.00 so our gross income was \$1900.00. After all expenses were paid including the target costs we made a profit of \$700.00. Our last shoot, the No-Name Open, was held on August 5th. It also involved the 12 Ga. and 20 Ga. guns. This was an extremely small shoot involving only 30 entries, 15 in each gun. After expenses we were able to show a net profit of \$400.00.

For the year 2007 we made a total of \$1918.00 after paying for all expenses including the cost of the skeet birds thrown during the shoots. This profit was garnered after an enormous amount of work hours were expended. The skeet shoots are labor-intensive. Fortunately, we have a small but dedicated group of workers who make the shoots run smoothly. They function in many ways but those who referee the shoots are the major contributors to the ultimate profit. These folks donate their time which otherwise would cost \$85/day!

We need more members to participate as registered skeet shooters. The Fin must depend almost entirely on the willingness of shooters from other clubs both within and external to Connecticut, in order to hold successful and profitable shoots. At the shoot held on Aug. 5th, we had 15 shooters in each gun, but only 1 or 2 were Fin members. We must somehow increase the participation of the Fin members in these and other shoots!

The Fin will again host three shoots during the 2008 season. The Northeast Open will be held June 6-8, 2008. It is our premier shoot and involves all five events – doubles, 12 Ga., 20 Ga., 28 Ga., and the .410. Later in the summer on July 13th we will host the Fin Open, a two-gun shoot in 12 and 20 Gauge. Finally on August 24th we will host the No-Name Open with 12 and 20 gauge shoots. This latter event occurs the weekend before the State Shoot and thus will provide a nice warm-up for that competition that will be hosted at the Hartford Gun Club.

The Fin will host the 2009 Zone 1 registered shoot and the 2009 Connecticut State Skeet shoot. Last year, these two events garnered us more than \$10,000 not including income from the bar and field kitchen. We need to prepare now for these 2009 events and some of this preparation should involve a club-wide attempt to increase the participation of members in the shoots this year so they will be prepared to compete in 2009.

OF INTERST

"HUNTERS FOR LOVE OF THE LAND"

This was the title of a recent pro-hunting article published in *National Geographic* magazine (Nov. 2007; volume 212, pp. 112-139). It is well worth reading and presents ample evidence to its readership that hunters contribute substantial monies, time and effort to the conservation of wildlife and open space. The article's author Robert Poole, former executive editor of *National Geographic*, notes that, "The irony is that many species might not survive at all were it not for hunters trying to kill them. The nation's 12.5 million hunters have become essential partners in wildlife management."

HARD WATER HOT SPOT: MANSFIELD HOLLOW RESERVOIR



Some 460 acres of ice is waiting for your auger and tilts this winter at the Mansfield Hollow Reservoir in the towns of Mansfield, Chaplin and Windham. Known as Naubesatuck Lake in the local native language, Mansfield Hollow is one of the state's Bass Management Lakes and Northern Pike Lakes. That means the state Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) has imposed slot length restrictions and creel limits to improve the average size and number of Bass and Pike. Studies conducted by the DEP revealed that some lakes and ponds, like Mansfield Hollow, were overfished, impacting the quality of fish caught, as well as the fishing experience. With the new regulations the fish populations are healthy and strong. In fact, Mansfield Hollow has more fish species to offer than Bass and Pike. We have all heard about the 26-pound, 13-ounce channel catfish caught in February 2005. Did you also know that the state record rainbow trout was caught at Mansfield Hollow? It weighed in at 14 pounds, 10 ounces. Pike are common to 34 inches, which nets out to approximately eight pounds. Some Pike pulled from these waters have reached 15 pounds. Largemouth Bass are common in the 10- to 14-inch range. You will also find the other assorted cast of characters: black crappie, pumpkinseed, bluegill sunfish, and yellow perch. The Army Corp owns the property so the entire shore is accessible to the public. Give it a try.

BUTCHERING A DEER
