Treasurer's Report

Each month, I read the financial report to the executive board and then to the members at the membership meeting. I announce how we are doing with our loans. For those who don't know the Fin has two loans. One loan was obtained so we could rebuild and improve the skeet and trap fields. As you all know we have a great skeet and trap facility. Our club is one of the best facilities in the State. The other loan was obtained so we could purchase a parcel of land we call the Murray Ostrager property.

The Fin pays monthly payments on these loans. The skeet field loan has \$156,815.48 remaining to pay as of May 31, 2006. As a club, we pay a monthly payment of \$845.57 in interest and \$296.05 in principle. As of yet, the Fin has not paid ahead on this loan. The Ostrager loan is paid directly to Murray himself. We pay the current payment and one additional month's principle each month which is about \$403.76 in interest and \$693.08 in principle. The club has authorized an additional \$10,000 payment each year to reduce the principle of this loan.

Everyone dislikes interest payments. However without the use of

someone else's money the club would not have been able to purchase the land or improve our facilities. So, when you read or hear me say how much we have spent and how much we still owe, I want you to remember we would not have been able to purchase the land or make the improvements without using someone's else's money. Every business in the world has loans under which they operate. The important thing to remember is that when a business has a loan they need to earn enough money to pay off the loan and interest. This means that we need to charge enough for the skeet and trap rounds so we can pay the skeet field renovation loan. The loan on the land purchase is paid for with our dues.

I can't say this any stronger. Everything we do to help earn money will make paying these loans easier. Please hold activities and programs that will bring in some money. Dinners seem to be our biggest non-shooting money makers, especially steak diners. Use your creative think skills and organize a function.


