


Club Annual Kids' Fishing Derby: May 7

2005 FLY POND RULES & REGULATIONS

Absolutely no feeding of fish. Anyone caught feeding the fish will lose their fishing privileges for the year.

No exceptions will be made!!!!!

1. All flies must be a single, "barbless" hook. Weight must be incorporated into the fly, no external sinkers are allowed. Strike indicators are allowed. No power bait. The fly pond will be open to all fishing and the spin pond rules apply beginning on June 1, 2005.

2. The fly pond will be open to fishing on Sunday April 3rd, 2005 after the fishing derby April 2nd.

3. The fly pond will be closed the day of and the day following each stocking. Please respect this for the health of the fish.

4. Members may bring a guest for a fee of \$10 per day, payable at the bar. The guest is entitled to one (1) fish and must stop fishing when one fish is killed.

5. The member limit is two (2) fish per day, six (6) fish per week to a total of twenty-four (24) fish per year.

6. No person 18 years of age or older who is not a regular, life or honorary member is allowed to fish except as a fee paying guest (\$10 per day, 1 fish limit)

7. A member and family may fish together but are limited to 1 fish/day each. Each fish applies against the members' season allotment. The weekly allotment cannot be exceeded.

8. Members and guests must sign in on arrival at the ponds, name and member number is required (please print). All fish retained must be recorded in the space provided after the member's name and number.

9. All fish taken must be killed before leaving club grounds. State Law!

- 10. Once you have retained your limit of fish you must stop fishing. There will be no giving away of fish so as to be able to continue fishing.
- 11. No parking is allowed around the ponds except with a handicap sticker.
- 12. Rule violations will automatically revoke a member's fishing privileges until a hearing is held and then a season ban may be imposed.

2005 SPIN/BAIT POND RULES & REGULATIONS

Absolutely no feeding of fish. Anyone caught feeding the fish will lose their fishing privileges for the year.

No exceptions will be made!!!!!

- 1. The lower pond (Skeet Field) and middle pond are designated for Spin/Bait fishing. The middle pond is also designated as fly-fishing. A lures, flies and bait hooks must be a single barbless hook.
- 2. These ponds will be open to fishing on Saturday April 2nd, 2005 provided ice out.
- 3. BAIT IS ALLOWED BUT <u>NO MINNOWS OR CORN!</u> ALL FISH CAUGHT WITH BAIT MUST BE RETAINED! NO EXCEPTIONS!!!
- 4. The ponds are closed the day of and the day following each stocking. Please respect this for the health of the fish.
- 5. embers may bring a guest for a fee of \$10 per day, payable at the bar. The guest is entitled to one (1) fish and must stop fishing when one fish is killed.
- 6. The member limit is two (2) fish per day, six (6) fish per week to a total of twenty-four (24) fish per year.
- 7. No person 18 years of age or older who is not a regular, life or honorary member is allowed to fish except as a fee paying guest (\$10 per day, 1 fish limit).
- 8. A member and family may fish together but are limited to 1 fish/day each. Each fish applies against the members' season allotment. The weekly allotment cannot be exceeded.

Notice:

You must purchase a valid 2005 Armband to hunt turkey, deer, waterfowl, pheasant, and so forth on club-owned and club-leased land.

Members are hereby notified that they must observe all State hunting laws and regulations in addition to Club Rules.

Failure to abide by State law and regulations or Club rules may result in Board action against the offending member, including action subsequent to court rulings against the member.

2005 Hunting Rules & Regulations

OBSERVE ALL STATE HUNTING LAWS

500 Foot Zone: It is prohibited to hunt with, shoot, or carry a loaded firearm within *500 feet* of any building occupied by people or domestic animals, or used for storage of flammable material.

Hunting Near Roads, Buildings, People, and Domestic Animals: Hunting or shooting from or across the traveled portion of any public roadway is prohibited. Shooting toward any person, building, or domestic animal when within range is prohibited.

Sunday Hunting Prohibited: Possession of hunting implements on Sunday in the open is prima facie evidence of violation. Sunday hunting is allowed on licensed private shooting preserves when the operator has permission from the town.

Motor vehicles: Hunting or shooting from a motor vehicle is prohibited (except under Handicapped Hunting Opportunities, see 2005 CT Hunting and Trapping Guide)

Firearms in Vehicles: It is prohibited to carry a loaded firearm in a vehicle.

Fluorescent Orange Requirement: During the period September 1 through the last day of February, hunters are required to wear at least 400 inches of fluorescent orange clothing above the waist and visible from all sides (for exceptions applied to archery deer and archery and firearms turkey hunters and others, see 2005 CT Hunting and Trapping Guide.

Legal Shooting Hours: Do you know when it is legal to start and stop hunting? It is your responsibility to consult the 2005 CT Hunting and Trapping Guide!

OBSERVE ALL CLUB RULES AND REGULATIONS

Field Dress Game Only. Hunters are allowed to field dress game (remove entrails) only. Do not completely dress your game animal until you reach home. Also, dressing of game animals at the Club is prohibited.

- Pheasant hunting will start at 8:00 am on Saturday and Wednesday, and in accordance with state law during the week. All pheasant hunters must sign in on the assigned group sheets, before hunting on Saturday, and Wednesday
- 2. Members are allowed two (2) pheasants per day. A Junior member may pick his/her own A, B, or Wednesday season, but must hunt with a Club member who has a valid CT hunting license and is over 21 years of age. Members may bring a guest, but the guest may not hunt or carry a gun, only observe. Members may bring spouse who also hunts when pheasant hunting, but must split daily bag limit.
- Hunting or training of dogs near or around the pheasant pens is prohibited.
 - There shall be no hunting on the Clubhouse side of the rifle/pistol range access road.
 - All dogs must be leashed on the mowed grass area on the clubhouse side of the driveway.
- 400 inches of fluorescent orange clothing must be above the waist and visible from all sides at all times while hunting.
- Hunting of turkey and deer on Club-owned and Club-leased property:
 - ◆ Turkey and deer hunting is allowed on Club-owned (bow only) and Club-leased property, with a Club Permit, armband, a

- valid CT hunting license, and tags. Junior members may apply for deer and turkey permits to hunt on Club-owned and Club-leased property and must hunt with a Club member who has a valid CT hunting license and is over 21 years of age. All season and bag limits are in accordance with CT state laws and regulations.
- Bow hunting for deer/turkey is allowed on Club-owned property with a Club permit, armband, and a valid CT hunting license and tags.
- Waterfowl hunting is allowed on Club-leased property. All state and federal hunting regulations and bag limits in addition to Club rules must be observed, with the exception being on Saturdays. Waterfowl hunting on Saturdays during the upland bird (pheasant) season is not allowed before 1:00 p.m. on Club-leased land. There will be no permanent blinds or dug pits allowed.
- No parking in the skeet field parking lot until 10:00 a.m. on Saturdays during the hunting season, unless you have a handicapped permit vehicle.
- 7. Parking is allowed only where directed.
- 8. All pheasants must be signed in immediately after hunting.
- Rifle & pistol ranges and skeet fields are closed on Saturdays and Wednesdays until 10:00 a.m. Use extreme caution when hunting near these areas.
- 10. Pheasants shot on Club-owned or Club-leased property do not have to be tagged with state tags, but must be signed in.
- 11. No shot size larger than #6 chilled shot shall be used while pheasant hunting on Club-owned or Club-leased property. Ammo to be checked at sign-in.
- 12. All dogs must be kept on leash or must come to heel after your party has taken its limit of pheasants.
- 13. Observe all state rules and regulations when hunting.
- Use of motorized ATVs (All Terrain Vehicles) is restricted to Clubowned property, with Executive Committee approval. For more information on this option, please consult "Rules for use of ATVs," 1998.
- 15. On Thanksgiving Day fields will be stocked. All hunters are welcome.
 - ♦ All hunters must check in before hunting.
 - ♦ Hunting starts at 8:00 a.m.
- Pheasant harvest record weekday sign-in book is located inside the Clubhouse at the bar entrance.
- 17. No hunting on Wednesday until 10:00 a.m. on any Club-owned or Club-leased property, except by allowed Wednesday morning hunters and Turkey and deer hunters.
- 18. Observe Red Zone signs without exception.
- 19. This year Arm Bands are mandatory, must be purchased before hunting, and must be worn when hunting deer, turkey, waterfowl, pheasant, and upland small game on Club-owned and Club-leased property. Exception arm band may be removed while hunting turkey or archery deer, while the hunter is in a stationary blind or ground stand.

Armband Update

This year 2005 Armbands will be mandatory for all members hunting Club-owned and Club-leased property. This will include Deer, Turkey, Waterfowl, Pheasant, and Upland small game.

Written Consent forms will only be issued to members in good standing who have purchased an armband for the currant year. You may pick up your armband and consent form at the same time. In an effort to make things easier for everyone we will no longer have the Pheasant Hunting Group Applications. When you come down to purchase your 2005 Armband just tell the Bartender which group you wish to hunt (Group A, B, or Wed.) and he/she will issue you your armband and sign you up for that specific group. The cost for a 2005 Armband is \$5.00 and may only be purchased at the Bar during regular bar hours from April 30, 2005 to December 31, 2005.

If anyone is interested in shooting in an Informal Trap League this summer, please contact me. If you have never tried shooting trap before, give it a try. It's a great shooting sport. The FFF is holding 2 shoots this year. One on June 19th and one on August 28th.






